Chairperson's Report

Year ended 31 March 2020

I am delighted to present the Annual Report of Craigmillar Literacy Trust. In 2019-20 we had another bumper year of achievements and activity. We celebrated the 21st year of our much-loved Books for Babies project with the ongoing delivery of programmes in the community with families. Our Creating and Learning Together project continued to develop its programme of residencies and activities in schools and in the community to complement our autumn Book Festival.

These are only brief mentions of this year's busy programme supporting people's literacy in the community of Craigmillar. We worked with nearly two thousand children, young people and families. We worked with every early learning and childcare centre, every primary and secondary school serving the area, Craigmillar Library, children's and youth projects, medical practices, and health, social work and education professionals as well as our supportive local elected members. We would like to thank all the families and children as well as our partners, community friends and everyone who worked with us to support our activities in Craigmillar.

Our programme was delivered with the support of our small but expert staff team - Ågot Bugge, Michelle Jones and Kara Whelan, along with Katie Swann and Sadie Ryan who covered Ågot's maternity cover. They were joined by our dedicated and expert sessional staff, volunteers and freelance contributors. We celebrated the arrival of Agot Bugge's new baby and the 10th anniversary of Michelle Jones's time with Books for Babies. As a Board we extend our deepest thanks to everyone for their contributions, enthusiasm and commitment.

We are very grateful for the support we receive from funders. Without their continued interest and commitment to our work in the community of Craigmillar we would not be able to sustain our programme. We would like to say a heartfelt thanks to our multi-year funders, the trusts that continue to support us every year and to our new funders for showing great faith in what we do.

We would also like to thank individuals who give regularly to support our work, and for one off acts of generosity. We spend our resources with care as every few pounds can support the purchase of a book for a family, an additional hour of our sessional staff's time or contribute to the nuts and bolts of running our very modest office.

As part of the development of our organisation, we have continued to explore options for the management structure of our organisation. We were delighted that Kara Whelan took on management responsibilities to help us do this from January 2020. We produced a five-year strategy for the organisation with a new vision, aims and objectives which will provide the foundation for our ongoing work. We welcomed two new members to our Board and said goodbye to our Treasurer, Remo Lanni. Being a trustee of a a charity requires dedication and a commitment of time and energy. As Chairperson, I would like to thank everyone who has contributed to the work of the Board this year.

We are looking forward to 2020-21, even though the end of the year in March brought new challenges with the COVID-19 pandemic. Our programme moved online before the end of March, demonstrating our flexibility and commitment to keeping our connections live with families in difficult times. Our work will be even more needed in the future as a result of COVID-19. We are therefore doubly committed to working with the community of Craigmillar, our funders and partners in supporting literacy in Craigmillar in 2020-21.

Structure, governance and management

Craigmillar Literacy Trust is a company limited by guarantee governed by its Memorandum and Articles (19th January 1998 and revised 7th September 2011). It is registered as a charity with the Office of the Scottish Charity Regulator.

Appointment of Trustees

The Trustees are elected or re-elected by the members at the Annual General Meeting. The Trustees hold regular board meetings and monitor the financial situation of the Charity closely. None of the Trustees receive remuneration or other benefit from their work with the charity.

Year ended 31 March 2020

The Trustees are pleased to present their annual Directors Report, together with the Financial Statements of the charity for the year ending 31 March 2020. These are also prepared to meet the requirements for a Directors' report and Accounts for Companies Act purposes.

The Financial Statements comply with the Charities and Trustee Investment (Scotland) Act 2005, the Charities Accounts (Scotland) Regulations 2006 (as amended), the Companies Act 2006, the Memorandum and Articles of Association, and Accounting and Reporting by Charities: Statement of Recommended Practice applicable to charities preparing their account in accordance with the Financial Reporting Standard for Smaller Entities.

Purposes of Craigmillar Literacy Trust

The purposes of the company, Craigmillar Literacy Trust, are:

- The advancement of education, lifelong learning and life chances through the provision of activities related to advancing literacy and reading
- The advancement of the arts, heritage, culture and science through the promotion of reading and literacy
- The organisation of cultural and leisure activities to enhance quality of life including for those who have need of them because of socio-economic disadvantage.

Activities

During 2019-20, Craigmillar Literacy Trust's strategic aims and objectives were taken forward through the activities of our two projects, Craigmillar Books for Babies and Creating and Learning Together. Both strands of work contributed to our overall aim of supporting lifelong literacy in the community of Craigmillar with a focus on supporting children and young people's literacy from 0 to 18 years through working with families, schools, services and other local organisations.

Work on the Strategic Plan moved forward significantly and the Trust has now identified 5 goals to achieve for 2020-2024.

Goal 1

To deliver an effective early literacy programme to families with babies and young children in the community.

Goal 2

To deliver an effective literacy programme to children and young people between the ages of 4 and 18 and their families in the community, promoting learning and creativity.

Goal 3

To develop new ways to deliver literacy support to adults in the community.

Goal 4

To develop as a visible, accessible literacy organisation in all aspects of our work.

Goal 5

To ensure our governance and management arrangements and structures meet the needs of the organisation.

Craigmillar Books for Babies

Aims and objectives

Working towards goals 1, 3 and 4 of the Strategic Plan, the Books for Babies project has the following objectives:

- to support and encourage parents and carers to share books, rhymes and songs with their babies and young children.
- to support and encourage early communication between parents and carers and babies
- to share information and knowledge about early childhood development with families and partners
- to promote attachment and support the development of relationships within families and the Craigmillar community.

Our approach is flexible, strengths-based and informed by our relationship with families and community partners. We currently have over 800 families in our project.

What we have done

Over the past year we have delivered the following activities:

Family Support at Home: an attachment-led home visiting programme supporting early communication, language and relationships

Family Support at Home is a home visiting programme, delivered in families' homes following a referral from a Health Visitor or Speech and Language Therapist. The aim of the visits is to build relationships with the family to support them to share books, rhymes, songs and talking with their babies. When babies and young children have these shared experiences with their parents/carers it builds the relationship, promotes well-being and lays the foundations for a lifetime's future learning.

In 2019-20 the Family Support at Home programme supported 45 children in 36 families, and aimed to achieve the following outcomes:

- Children with additional support needs will have increased vocabulary
- Children with additional support needs will have improved family relationships
- Children with additional support needs will be more confident learners

Talking Together: a partnership programme with the NHS Speech and Language Therapy service supporting early communication, speech and language and social connection

Talking Together is an early communication support programme co delivered with NHS Speech and Language Therapy. In the past year, 103 families were supported through the programme which consisted of:

- Talking Together Early Communication Support
- Talking Together Home Visits
- Talking Together Parent and Child Group

The programme was externally evaluated in 2019 by Iconic Consulting and in February 2020 a new Talking Together group was piloted.

Rhymetimes and Storytimes in the Community: group activities promoting early development and social connection

We delivered our weekly Baby & Toddler Rhymetimes, monthly Saturday Storytimes with our Storyteller in Residence, Eric Brennan as well as a monthly Polish Rhymetime and a monthly presence at Greengables Family Centre Hub. During the year Family Support at Home and Talking Together became more integrated into the Baby & Toddler Rhymetime with a monthly Talking Together presence and the development of Talking Together groups. In total, 440 individual families participated in our Rhymetime and Storytime programme in Craigmillar Library.

Edinburgh International Book Festival

We returned to the EIBF in August 2019 to deliver two Rhymetime events, two Scots Rhymetimes, one Polish Rhymetime and a discussion panel event on Building Resilience in Children. Thirteen families from our project attended the Rhymetime events.

Book-gifting programme: one to one support and advice on sharing books and songs

We worked with Health Visitors in four local practices - Craigmillar Medical Group, Niddrie Medical Practice, Milton Surgery and Southfield Surgery - to gift books to over 300 families joining the project at the 10-day notification visit. Our Baby Clinic Volunteer met with 163 families over the year to share information and advice about sharing books and to gift book bags.

Transition Programme: information sharing and connecting families and professionals

Our 'Thinking About Nursery' event was held twice in the past year with representatives from local early years and childcare settings attending. The project continued to play a key role in coordinating meetings of the Transition Working Group.

Raising Children with Confidence Course: exploring emotional well-being and how we can promote it in ourselves and children. We delivered two 6-week courses at Greengables Family Centre. In total 12 parents/carers completed the course.

Parent Involvement: designing, developing and delivering elements of the project

During the past year we said goodbye to another one of our parents who left her post as Sessional Worker to commence work as an Early Years Practitioner in a local setting. Three parents/carers took on Sessional Staff roles supporting families at weekly Baby & Toddler Rhymetime, coordinating the Myra Robertson Book of the Year and undertaking consultations among parents/carers, leading the monthly Polish Rhymetime, leading a monthly Rhymetime at Greengables Family Centre and overseeing our Book Gifting Programme in the local Well Baby Clinic. Two parents took on volunteering roles within the project supporting Baby & Toddler Rhymetime and office administration. In 2019, 84 parents and carers took part in the Myra Robertson Book of the Year selecting books to go into our one Year Book Bag. Ten parents/carers took part in focus groups as part of a consultation on our Talking Together programme.

Major achievements

An external evaluation of Talking Together was completed in June 2019 by Iconic Consulting. The report was launched at a community event in October. A key finding was that:

"Talking Together has evolved into a valuable and integral part of Craigmillar Books for Babies which benefits hard to engage families with children with delayed language or communication." (Iconic Consulting, June 2019)

A Talking Together training programme was designed by the Development Worker and delivered to a group of 7 families over a three-week period. The sessions covered brain development, early communication and sharing books together.

"The whole course/training has been very useful and will help us with our baby's speech language and overall development. The course content is well researched and conducive to the whole life span/all ages. It summarises the importance of observing/learning babies' cues and starting with books and rhymes early to give babies a head start." (Parent feedback)

Family Support at Home received referrals from Health Visitors to support families with babies as young as 8 weeks. This is a major step towards recognising the importance of the first 1000 days in a young baby's life and to establishing the project as an important early intervention support.

"It (home visits) are absolutely invaluable and one of the main reasons the project is such a success. A lot of families are very vulnerable and being able to say to them that you don't have to come to us we'll come to you is so good." (Health Visitor feedback)

Objectives for the year ahead

- We will continue to deliver our programmes of support in line with the Strategic Plan and adapting to online delivery as necessary in response to COVID 19.
- We will develop our Talking Together training programme and explore ways of delivering this training online.
- We will develop partnership working with Health Visitors and Midwives to explore ways working antenatally.

Creating and Learning Together

Aims and objectives

Working towards goals 2, 3 and 4 of the Strategic Plan the Creating and Learning Together project has the following objective:

- to create and extend opportunities for children aged four plus, young people and families to enjoy engaging with literacy and learning, develop their reading, writing and communication skills and gain a lifelong love of reading.

What we have done

In the period April 2019 - March 2020, the Creating and Learning Together project focused on two main strands of work to meet our outcomes; the Craigmillar Book Festival and a Creative Residency. The chosen themes encouraged performers and participants to think about imagination, freedom, nature and the environment. In total we engaged with 1600 children, young people, professionals and parents over the course of the year.

Craigmillar Book Festival Dream Wild

Craigmillar Book Festival Dream Wild took place from 6th-16th November 2019.

Our aims and objectives in delivering the annual Book Festival were to deliver an exciting and stimulating annual ten-day programme to children and young people and their families in the community of Craigmillar, and in doing so to inspire children and young people in the community to read and write for pleasure.

We delivered the programme in partnership with Craigmillar Library as well as the local cluster primary and secondary schools - Castlebrae Community High School, Holy Rood High School, Castleview Primary School, Newcraighall Primary School, Niddrie Mill Primary School and St Francis RC Primary School

We also partnered with local voluntary organisations such as Craigmillar Community Grows, Carr Gomm and the Venchie.

- . Our 2019 festival programme consisted of:
- a programme of 29 author visits and workshops for local schools
- two Family Days held at Craigmillar Library
- Wildest Adventure story writing competition for local primary schools in partnership with the Parent Council at Castleview Primary School
- a Book Festival Opening event in Craigmillar Library which was attended by over 100 people and included a full class presentation from P4 at Castleview Primary School about their recently completed Wildest Dreams creative residency led by artist Katy Wilson
- a book launch by author Janis MacKay of her novel The Watchmaker's Wife set in Craigmillar with an audience of 60
- an exhibition, workshop and 'meet the artists' session with the Craigmillar Edible Stories project
- an outdoor storytelling event around the bonfire session at local children's project the Venchie, led by storyteller, Tim Porteous.

We were delighted that there were:

- 1,529 individual visits by children, young people and adults
- 36 events were held over ten days
- 20 authors, storytellers and illustrators who participated in our programme

Creative Residency Wildest Dreams

The Wildest Dreams Creative Residency took place during May and June 2019 at Castleview Primary School and was led by the artist Katy Wilson. Our aims for Wildest Dreams were to provide an inspiring framework that could harness the children's imaginations and enable children and adults to explore the local green spaces, community gardens and outdoors together and to extend the reach of arts and cultural engagement in the city and help overcome barriers to accessing it. 59 children aged 7 and 8 years took part in a series of adventures, learning about nature, drawing and storytelling, and ultimately making their own book. Children presented their work at the annual Craigmillar Book Festival in November 2019.

Major achievements

Craigmillar Book Festival school sessions Many of the events involved pupils creating their own stories or illustrations as a class or individually. In others, pupils took part in football penalty shootouts, learned how to use a slingshot, danced and sang. In our evaluation we found that children and young people were excited, energised, and had increased enthusiasm books and stories.

'I'm more confident when I write now.'

'It was fun to write stories.'

'Story writing is easier than I thought.' (quotes from young people)

Craigmillar Book Festival Dream Wild Family Days Out Among the highlights of this year's festival were two exuberant Saturday Family Days Out held in Craigmillar Library which aimed to provide a free and exciting full day of activities for children aged and their families. This focused on bookish activities for children and their families, connected to the theme of this year's festival Dream Wild. A total of 230 people took part.

'It was good and fun.'

'Me and my family had an awesome time.'

I enjoyed making a costume and badge making.' (quotes from young people)

Co-delivery of Wildest Adventure with parents/carers

In advance of this year's festival, the Literacy Programme Co-ordinator consulted with the Parent Council at Castleview Primary School, asking what they'd like to see in this year's festival. The result was the Wildest Adventure story writing competition judged by storyteller Tim Porteus, and school librarians Kelly Smith (Castlebrae Community High School) and Rachel McCabe (Holy Rood High School). The competition was popular, and uptake was very high.

Creative Residency Wildest Dreams

Feedback from the participants indicates that this project broadened their access to, and interest in, the outdoors within their local community. In our evaluation of the project, one of the pupils said 'my favourite part was exploring the woods because it was really cool, and they are so close to us'. Providing projects which take place in Craigmillar creates opportunities to engage with art projects that would not otherwise be available in the local area. One of the pupils said, 'my favourite parts were when we created our own monsters and made our own masks. We got the chance to be illustrators'.

Collaboration with other community organisations

Over the past year we increased our engagement and collaboration with other community-based organisations:

- Venchie Children and Young People Project Storytelling session with children and families
- Castleview Reading Collective 3 sessions in Craigmillar Library to share information about storytelling events and reading together.

- Jack Kane Community Centre event for children in foster care, kinship care and residential exploring the therapeutic value of reading together and for each other.
- Carr Gomm and Craigmillar Community Grows co-delivery of events during Craigmillar Book Festival

Objectives for the year ahead

- We will continue to deliver our programmes of support in line with the Strategic Plan and adapting to online delivery as necessary in response to COVID 19.
- We will undertake a community consultation to review aims of the project in line with the Strategic Plan.
- We will continue to build on community partnerships and collaborations to identify new areas of work to develop.

CRAIGMILLAR LITERACY TRUST'S PROGRAMME FOR 2020-21

From the 16th March 2020, the Board of Directors took the decision to suspend all front-line activities in an effort to safeguard staff, volunteers, families and the community from the spread of COVID-19. The organisation's response was immediate with a full online programme delivered to the end of March 2020. This will continue in 2020-21 and continue to focus on the following:

Delivering on-line programmes to reach the community we work with:

Craigmillar Books for Babies online programmes include:

- Twice weekly Baby & Toddler Rhymetime live on the project's Facebook page Tuesdays and Thursdays at 11am
- Daily Favourite Book of the Day shared on the project's YouTube channel and across social media platforms
- Daily Bedtime Stories live on the project's Facebook page Monday to Friday 6pm
- Saturday Storytime live once a month on the project's Facebook page last Saturday at 11am.

Developing new approaches and materials for our core programmes:

- Delivery of Family Support at Home through Facebook messenger, What's App video calls, text and phone calls.
- Development of content for Talking Together training groups. These groups are aimed at families with children under the age of 3 to share information on how babies and children learn to communicate.
- Planning for our annual autumn book festival and using the opportunity to explore new approaches to our Creating and Learning programme.

Supporting staff and volunteers during this time of uncertainty and concern by:

- Ensuring all staff and volunteers have up to date information on COVID-19 and are supported to practice social distancing and shielding by working from home.
- Ensuring staff and volunteers are supported in the event they have to self-isolate or become unwell
- Ensuring staff and volunteers are communicated with on a weekly basis via text, email and conference call as required.

Funding

Focussing on preparing applications and on the preparation of evaluation and funding reports for our funders.

Review of policies and procedures

Reviewing policies and procedures including finance, child protection and lone working.

Governance

Putting in place measures to deal with the current situation which include policies and procedures for staff and volunteers. The Board of Directors will continue to meet via conference call and will ensure all governance duties continue. The Chairperson and other office bearers will regularly communicate with the team to ensure that staff are supported.

Management

The staff team will continue to work from home for the foreseeable future. The organisation will be managed by the senior manager for the organisation, Kara Whelan. All normal management tasks will continue to be undertaken including operational tasks, preparation of papers and reports for Board meetings and funders, liaising with colleagues and partners in other agencies and keeping up to date with the latest government and public health advice and guidance.

Financial review

The statement of Financial Activities shows net outgoing resources of £17,338 (2019 £3,718).

The total funds of the charity as at 31 March 2020 amounted to £63,093 (2019 - £80,431).

1. General information

The charity is a public benefit entity and a private company limited by guarantee, registered in Scotland and a registered charity in Scotland. The address of the registered office is C.C.H.S., 2a Greendykes Road, Edinburgh, EH16 4DP.

2. Statement of compliance

These financial statements have been prepared in compliance with FRS 102, 'The Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and the Republic of Ireland', the Statement of Recommended Practice applicable to charities preparing their accounts in accordance with the Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland (FRS 102) (Charities SORP (FRS 102)) and the Companies Act 2006.

3. Accounting policies

Basis of preparation

The financial statements have been prepared on the historical cost basis.

The financial statements are prepared in sterling, which is the functional currency of the entity.

Going concern

There are no material uncertainties about the charity's ability to continue.

Fund accounting

Unrestricted funds are available for use at the discretion of the trustees to further any of the charity's purposes.

Restricted funds are subjected to restrictions on their expenditure declared by the donor or through the terms of an appeal, and fall into one of two sub-classes: restricted income funds or endowment funds.

Incoming resources

All income is included in the statement of financial activities when entitlement has passed to the charity, it is probable that the economic benefits associated with the transaction will flow to the charity and the amount can be reliably measured. The following specific policies are applied to particular categories of income:

- income from donations or grants is recognised when there is evidence of entitlement to the gift, receipt is probable and its amount can be measured reliably.
- investment income is included when receivable
- Incoming resources from charitable trading activity are accounted for when earned.

3. Accounting policies (continued)

Resources expended

Expenditure is recognised on an accruals basis as a liability is incurred. Expenditure includes any VAT which cannot be fully recovered, and is classified under headings of the statement of financial activities to which it relates:

- expenditure on raising funds includes the costs of all fundraising activities, events, noncharitable trading activities, and the sale of donated goods.
- expenditure on charitable activities includes all costs incurred by a charity in undertaking
 activities that further its charitable aims for the benefit of its beneficiaries, including those
 support costs and costs relating to the governance of the charity apportioned to charitable
 activities.
- other expenditure includes all expenditure that is neither related to raising funds for the charity nor part of its expenditure on charitable activities.

All costs are allocated to expenditure categories reflecting the use of the resource. Direct costs attributable to a single activity are allocated directly to that activity. Shared costs are apportioned between the activities they contribute to on a reasonable, justifiable and consistent basis.

Tangible assets

Tangible assets are initially recorded at cost, and subsequently stated at cost less any accumulated depreciation.

Depreciation

Depreciation is calculated so as to write off the cost or valuation of an asset, less its residual value, over the useful economic life of that asset as follows:
